

#### Letter from the President:

It has been busier than usual for me this Spring. Ceanne gave birth to our second baby boy. Nicholas John Gibbons was born on May 7, at 3:30 in the morning. In May, I got a swarm call in downtown Columbia. The swarm was in a small tree on the sidewalk on 9th Street. It wasn't a very big swarm and I wondered if it was worth the effort to catch. I decided to, since I was already there to catch it. I grabbed my ladder, saw, and catch box. For a catch box, I use a plastic storage box with part of the top and bottom cut out. Over the cut outparts, I have screen hot glued to the box. It makes a very nice container to eatch bees in. I set up my ladder and as crowds gathered, I climbed up and cut the branch, cropping the bee and branch right in m y box. The people around were amazed. What a perfect time to promote bee and honey! I stayed for awhile to talk bees and show everyone the Queen, Drones and Worker Bees. I'm telling this story because of what happened afterwards. When I got to the next bee yard, I set up a new home for the swarm. I have a wet super from last year's honey that had dark framesso. I used this to dump the swarm into. This usually works very well for hiving a swarm. Not this time though. I proceeded to start working on other hives in the yard. After about 30 minutes I went back to see how my swarm was doing. To my surprise, they were gone! I looked around and there they were back on a tree. I caught them again, put them back in the hive and 20 minutes later they were back in the tree. I had never had anything like this happen before. I decided to take a different approach. I was making splits so I set up a Queenless split in a single hive body, put newspaper with slits on top and set the other wet box on top of the newspaper. I went over to the swarm, found the Queen and caught her with bare fingers. I put her in an old Queen cage that I carry in with my battery box of Queens, then I took some of the candy and plugged my old Queen cage with the swarm Queen inside. I set her in the super above the newspaper and shook her swarm back in. I closed up the hive and wondered if it would work. I am happy to report that it did work! The Queen was released and laying. With the split that I gave it, it will be a honey producing colony! The moral of this story is that sometimes bees don't act the way a book or "experts" say they should. Don't be afraid to try something "new" or "unorthodox."

State Fair time is coming up so I hope everyone can make plans to help at the booth and enter honey in the honey show. It is a fun time for all. Also, bids will be taken for honey to be sold at the booth.

Please join us for our fall meeting at Tan-Tar-A Resort at the Lake of the Ozarks. We have an exciting agenda planned and we hope that all of our Missouri State Beekeepers will attend. Remember, communication and learning are the keys to successful beekeeping.

The group room rate is \$69.00. Please mention MSBA to get the special rate. The block of rooms will be held for us until September 30, 2004. The hotel's regular room rate for 2004 is \$164. Make sure that you are quoted the \$69 rate. All rooms include irons, ironing boards, hair dryers, and in-room coffee service. The hotel has both heated pools, out-door pools, and an exercise facility.

Make this meeting a mini-vacation. The special rate includes Thursday night through Sunday. If you want to add more days, please let me know, and I will arrange the same rate. A golfing event is planned if there is enough interest. We need to have 8 or more people to get a special price. Friday morning or Sunday morning would be the choices for the golfing.
